Review and Appeal

Council Inquiry



This fact sheet provides an overview for practitioners' review and appeal rights for decisions made by a Council Inquiry. You should seek advice about your individual circumstances. Your insurer, trade union or an independent lawyer may be able to assist. Council staff can provide information about the review or appeal process.

Review

What

You can seek a review if you believe the conditions imposed on your registration are no longer appropriate. We will consider how your circumstances have changed since we made the decision.

When

You can seek a review at any time, unless:

- the decision prevents you from seeking a review for a specified time period, or
- you have an appeal against the decision pending in either the Tribunal or the Supreme Court.

Who

The review is handled by the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT), unless the decision under review says the Council is the review body. You can also apply to NCAT if you want the Council to be the review body. We can provide information about how to apply.

How

You can write to our Executive Officer to request a review. If appropriate we will refer your application to the Tribunal. You may include material to support your request. The review body will determine whether the conditions under review are still appropriate.

What next

We will tell you if we are able to consider the application for review, and if so,

- when and how we will consider it,
- how you may participate, and
- when you can expect to receive the outcome.

Appeal

What

An appeal is a formal request to change or overrule a previous decision, or part of that decision.

When

You have a right to make an appeal, and you must do so within 28 days after you have been notified of the decision.

Who

The NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT) will handle your appeal.

How
